A LETTER FROM 21WILBERFORCE PRESIDENT



Dear Friends,

I confess that the persistent headlines and alarming statistics on religious persecution around the world trouble me greatly. Each year that passes, the number of individuals harassed, imprisoned, tortured and even killed for practicing their deepest beliefs increases. At 21Wilberforce our aim is to counter this trend through advocacy and awareness that stirs citizens of all beliefs to action.

Here in the U.S. that effort begins in partnership with congressional leadership. To that end I am pleased to announce, on behalf of 21Wilberforce, the release of the *Interim* International Religious Freedom Congressional Scorecard for the 115th session of Congress. This simple and informative tool measures important steps taken by members of Congress who have demonstrated the moral clarity needed to counter affronts to international religious freedom.



In 2017, for example, Senator Chris Coons (D-DE) and Senator Thom Tillis (R-NC) re-launched the Senate Human Rights Caucus, a bipartisan effort to highlight the importance of human rights in U.S. foreign policy. There are currently eight members in the Senate Human Rights Caucus. In the House, 53 members participated in the International Religious Freedom Caucus, 67 members served on the Tom Lantos Human

Rights Commission, 48 members were active on the House Religious Minorities in the Middle East Caucus and 32 members engaged with the Congressional Ahmadiyya Muslim Caucus. We are grateful for these efforts.

In addition to caucus and commission work, the Interim Scorecard tracks how members of the U.S. Senate and House of Representatives voted on bills, resolutions and amendments that support international religious freedom. The goal of the Interim Scorecard is two-fold: to recognize and thank members of Congress who have championed international religious freedom in tangible ways and to encourage legislators to take even bolder actions in support of this cause and the restoration of human dignity around the world.

As we mark the 20th anniversary of the International Religious Freedom Act, it is fitting that this year's *Interim* Scorecard demonstrates a renewed commitment among many congressional leaders to place religious freedom at the center of U.S. foreign policy. We are thankful for the promise of these efforts yet mindful of the work that remains.

INTRODUCTION

Global assaults on religious freedom occur at a staggering rate, with some 5.3 billion people – nearly 80% of the world – living in states characterized by religious persecution, discrimination or restrictions. According to a newly released report by Freedom House, global freedom has deteriorated to its lowest level in more than a decade, and with it the political rights and civil liberties of many of the world’s citizens. Religious persecution has contributed to an astounding 65.3 million refugees, asylum seekers and internally displaced persons worldwide.

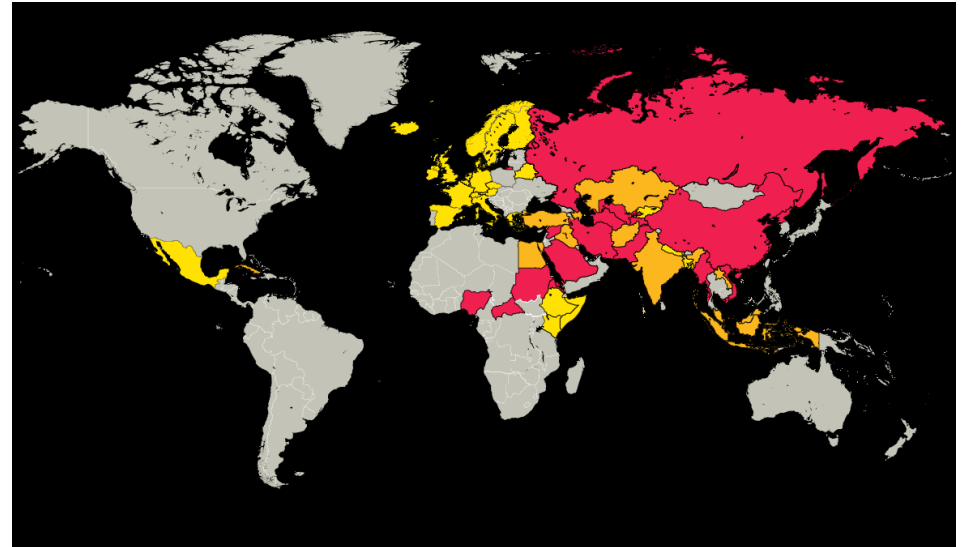
More than just impersonal calculations, however, these grim statistics illuminate the tragic human face of religious persecution in the early years of the 21st century.

It is the anguished face of a Rohingya mother in Myanmar whose baby son has been ripped from her arms by soldiers and flung into a fire. It is the haunting face of a young Yazidi woman who has endured repeated rape and torture at the hands of ISIS captors. Or the faces of orphaned children in Nigeria, remnant survivors of Christian villages decimated by militant Fulani herdsmen.

The faces are diverse and they are many – Copts in Egypt, Baha’i in Yemen, Christians in North Korea and China, Jehovah’s Witnesses in Russia, and religious minorities throughout Pakistan and Saudi Arabia.

In the United States, freedom of religion is the first freedom, enshrined in the First Amendment of the Constitution and foundational to the very origin and existence of the nation. It follows that religious freedom also would animate U.S. foreign policy – except oftentimes it does not.

The International Religious Freedom Act of 1998 (IRFA) and the amplified Frank R. Wolf International Religious Freedom Act of 2016 provide the framework for advancing religious freedom as a U.S. foreign policy imperative. It is in this same spirit that we present the *Interim* International Religious Freedom Scorecard as a measure of progress made toward that end. It is our hope that the Scorecard will both celebrate positive measures taken by members of Congress and also highlight opportunities that remain to further advance U.S. advocacy on behalf of individuals persecuted in foreign countries on account of religious beliefs.

- Activity has stepped up. As a whole, Congress introduced 25.6% more items that are scored (21-Senate and 28-House) in year one of the 115th Congress than they did in two years of the 114th Congress (14-Senate and 25-House).
- As was true with the 114th Congress Scorecard, overall scoring in the *Interim* Scorecard is bipartisan for the Senate and the House.
- Scores dropped slightly with one-quarter of members of Congress scoring “above average” compared to one-third scoring “above average” during the 114th Congress.
- The Senate re-launched a Human Rights Caucus. (It was first introduced in 2014 but inactive for the 114th Congress.)

OVERVIEW

The *Interim* International Religious Freedom (IRF) Congressional Scorecard reports on the first year of the 115th Congress, the term of which is January through December 2017. The scoring system is designed to encourage reliable and consistent scoring of federal legislation relevant to international religious freedom. To avoid bias, we base inclusion criteria on important bills, resolutions, and amendments that protect and promote international religious freedom in the U.S. Senate and the House. Legislative data is sourced from www.congress.gov.

Legislators can also demonstrate their support through membership in caucuses. For the House, scoring acknowledges membership in the International Religious Freedom Caucus, the Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission, Congressional Ahmadiyya Muslim Caucus, and the Religious Minorities in the Middle East (RMME) Caucus. Members in the Senate who participate in the Senate Human Rights Caucus also earn points.

It is important to note that while the *Interim* IRF Congressional Scorecard is a resource for analyzing a legislator's current support for international religious freedom issues, it is not the only measure of his or her record. Many bills and resolutions introduced in Congress are never scheduled for a vote. For that reason, the *Interim* IRF Congressional Scorecard awards points for sponsorship or co-sponsorship of relevant international religious freedom bills that are introduced but have not received a vote.

THREE METRICS

Metrics scored with points awarded for the following demonstrations of support:

- A-Sponsoring or co-sponsoring international religious freedom bills, resolutions, and amendments
- B-Voting for such items
- C-Chairing or co-chairing relevant caucuses

Low scores do not necessarily indicate disagreement with international religious freedom legislation, but rather that it was not a high priority for that legislator. Conversely, high scores indicate that a given legislator has made support of international religious freedom a priority.

By custom, the Speaker of the House (Paul Ryan) and the House Minority leader (Nancy Pelosi) do not vote on all issues and, therefore, they are not scored. Representatives Amata Radewagen (R-AS), Eleanor Holmes Norton (D-DC), Madeleine Bordallo (D-GU), Gregorio Sablan (D-NMI), Jenniffer González-Colón (D-PR) and Stacey Plaskett (D-VI) are non-voting delegates, but their level of support for scored items is noted.

Letter grades will be reported in the *Final* 115th IRF Congressional Scorecard scheduled for release in February 2019.

Cosponsors reported in the *Interim* IRF Congressional Scorecard may differ from numbers reported on <http://www.congress.gov/> because some legislators may have signed on as cosponsors after 12/31/17.

Selection criteria for Notable Leaders in the Senate is a score of 10 points or higher and in the House a score of 15 points or higher.

PARTICIPANTS IN THE SCORECARD PROCESS

An analyst is responsible for determining the content of the Scorecard, including evaluation criteria and scores. Our research associate manages the Scorecard process and participates in data-gathering and scoring. 21Wilberforce staff provide feedback on the legislation selected to be scored.

DISCLAIMER

A Scorecard is an imperfect tool; there are additional factors that cannot be reflected therein. Not all efforts made in the promotion and protection of international religious freedom can be publicly recorded. We recognize that members and their staff can and do support international religious freedom through quiet diplomacy and casework, such as letters to the President, legislators, ambassadors and other foreign officials. Members also prioritize efforts on behalf of their constituents. Additionally, family-related issues may arise, such as the birth of a child or a death in the family, which may result in legislators missing votes.

The *Interim* IRF Congressional Scorecard is an educational tool meant to highlight and track key activity related to international religious freedom. It should not be perceived as an effort to support or endorse specific legislators or candidates.



SENATE SCORED ITEMS

1. S.198 Combating European Anti-Semitism Act of 2017

This bill expresses the sense of Congress that it is in the U.S. national interest to combat anti-Semitism at home and abroad; there is a need to ensure the security of European Jewish communities, including synagogues, schools, and cemeteries; and the United States should continue to emphasize the importance of combating anti-Semitism in multilateral bodies.

Primary Sponsor: Marco Rubio R-FL
Status: 1/24/17 Referred to Foreign Relations Committee; 24 Cosponsors

2. S.905 Syrian War Crimes Accountability Act of 2017

This bill requires a report on, and authorizes technical assistance for, accountability for war crimes, crimes against humanity, and genocide in Syria.

Status: 6/12/17 Placed on Senate Legislative Calendar under General Orders; 20 Cosponsors

3. S.1118 North Korean Human Rights Reauthorization Act of 2017

This bill amends the North Korean Human Rights Act of 2004 to authorize appropriations through 2022 for programs that promote human rights, democracy, the rule of law, and the development of a market economy in North Korea; actions to promote freedom of information in North Korea; and humanitarian assistance to North Koreans who are outside of North Korea without the permission of the government.

4. S.1158 Elie Wiesel Genocide and Atrocities Prevention Act of 2017

This bill helps prevent acts of genocide and other atrocity crimes, which threaten national and international security, by enhancing United States government capacities to prevent, mitigate, and respond to such crises.

5. S.1292 Special Envoy to Monitor and Combat Anti-Semitism Act of 2017

This bill amends the State Department Basic Authorities Act of 1956 to provide that the Special Envoy to Monitor and Combat Anti-Semitism shall have the rank of ambassador and be a person of recognized distinction in the field of combating anti-Semitism or religious freedom and shall serve as the primary advisor and coordinator in the U.S. government relating to monitoring and combating anti-Semitism and anti-Semitic incitement in foreign countries.

SENATE SCORED ITEMS

6. S.1574 Vietnam Human Rights Sanctions Act of 2017

This bill expresses the sense of Congress that the U.S. relationship with Vietnam cannot progress while Vietnam's human rights record continues to deteriorate and that the Secretary of State should designate Vietnam as a country of particular concern with respect to religious freedom. It imposes sanctions on individuals complicit in human rights abuses committed against Vietnam nationals or their family members.

7. S.1891 Promoting Peace and Justice for the People of Afghanistan Act of 2017

This bill expresses the sense of Congress that Afghanistan and the Afghan Taliban should reach a political settlement in which the Taliban accepts the Afghan constitution, including its safeguards to respect human rights, especially of women, girls, and religious minorities and that Afghanistan should take consistent steps to protect and advance the rights of those groups.

8. S.2060 Burma Human Rights and Freedom Act of 2017

This bill establishes US policy supporting the establishment of a peaceful, prosperous, and democratic Burma that includes respect for the human rights of all its people regardless of ethnicity and religion, including an end to the humanitarian and human rights crisis, the return of the displaced Rohingya to their homes, and equal access to full restoration of full citizenship for the Rohingya population.

9. S.2120 International Violence Against Women Act of 2017

This bill calls for the appointment of an Ambassador-at-Large for Global Women's Issues at the Department of State and a Senior Coordinator for Gender Equality and Women's Empowerment at the United States Agency for International Development to develop comprehensive, multisector, and holistic individual country plans designed to address and respond to violence against women and girls that include strategies, as appropriate, designed to accommodate the needs of stateless, disabled, internally displaced, refugee, or religious or ethnic minority women and girls.

SENATE SCORED ITEMS

10. S.Con.Res.29 A Concurrent resolution recognizing the 100th anniversary of the Balfour Declaration

This resolution commemorates the centenary of the Balfour Declaration which clearly recognized and sought to uphold the “civil and religious rights of the existing non-Jewish communities in Palestine,” as well as the “rights and political status enjoyed by Jews in any other country.” It affirms US commitment to maintaining the strongest bilateral ties with Israel.

11. S.Con.Res.30 A Concurrent resolution expressing the sense of Congress with respect to United States policy toward Tibet and that the treatment of the Tibetan people should be an important factor in the conduct of United States relations with the People’s Republic of China

This resolution urges the U.S. to publicly call for the immediate and unconditional release of all those held prisoner for expressing their political or religious views in Tibet; to continue to designate China as a country of particular concern pursuant to the International Religious Freedom Act of 1998; and to urge the Chinese government to stop the demolition of Tibetan Buddhist religious institutions and revise religious and travel regulations to conform with international human rights standards.

12. S.Res.109 A resolution encouraging the Government of Pakistan to release Aasiya Noreen, internationally known as Asia Bibi, and reform its religiously intolerant laws regarding blasphemy

This resolution urges the government of Pakistan to release Asia Bibi and ensure that she, her family, and her legal counsel are safe; to reform its laws to reflect democratic norms and ideals; and to promote tolerance of religious minorities so that no one is in danger of persecution for exercising free speech and practicing their religion.

Primary Sponsor: Rand Paul R-KY
Status: 4/4/17 Referred to Foreign Relations Committee; 7 Cosponsors



SENATE SCORED ITEMS

13. S.Res.139 A resolution condemning the Government of Iran's state-sponsored persecution of its Baha'i minority and its continued violation of the International Covenants on Human Rights

This resolution urges the President and the Department of State to condemn the Iranian government's continued violation of human rights and demand the immediate release of prisoners held solely on account of their religion and to impose sanctions on Iranian officials and other individuals directly responsible for serious human rights abuses.

Primary Sponsor: Ron Wyden D-OR
Status: 12/21/17 Agreed to in Senate with an amendment and an amended preamble by Unanimous Consent; 33 Cosponsors

14. S.Res.162 A resolution reaffirming the commitment of the United States to promoting religious freedom

This resolution reaffirms the U.S. commitment to promoting religious freedom as a fundamental human right and calls for the President to strengthen U.S. foreign policy and action plans on behalf of individuals persecuted in foreign countries on account of religion. It urges the State Department to implement training on religious freedom policy for all Foreign Service officers, ambassadors, and diplomats. It also urges the U.S. government to develop a comprehensive response to protect victims of religious persecution and to provide humanitarian and recovery assistance to affected individuals in Iraq and Syria. It calls for the re-establishment of the Religion and Foreign Policy Working Group and for the U.S. government to ensure that trade negotiations include religious freedom conditions mandated by the Bipartisan Congressional Trade Priorities and Accountability Act of 2015.

15. S.Res.176 A resolution commemorating the 50th anniversary of the reunification of Jerusalem

This resolution reaffirms support for Israel's commitment to religious freedom and administration of holy sites in Jerusalem and continues to support strengthening the mutually beneficial American-Israeli relationship.

Primary Sponsor: Mitch McConnell R-KY
Status: 6/5/17 Agreed to 90-0; 45 Cosponsors



SENATE SCORED ITEMS

16. S.Res.220 A resolution expressing solidarity with Falun Gong practitioners who have lost lives, freedoms, and rights for adhering to their beliefs and practices and condemning the practice of non-consenting organ harvesting

This resolution calls upon China and the Communist Party of China to cease persecution of Falun Gong practitioners and release all such practitioners who have been confined, detained, or imprisoned for pursuing their right to exercise their spiritual beliefs; to end the practice of organ harvesting from all prisoners of conscience; and to allow an independent and transparent investigation into organ transplant abuses.

Status: 7/13/17 Referred to Foreign Relations Committee; 13 Cosponsors

17. S.Res.229 A resolution recognizing the contributions of the Montagnard indigenous tribespeople of the Central Highlands of Vietnam to the United States Armed Forces during the Vietnam War, and condemning the ongoing violation of human rights by the Government of the Socialist Republic of Vietnam

This resolution calls on Vietnam to allow human rights groups access to all regions of the country and to end restrictions of basic human rights, including the right for Montagnards to practice their Christian faith freely, the right to land and property, freedom of movement, the right to retain ethnic identity and culture, and access to an adequate standard of living.

Status: 7/24/17 Referred to Foreign Relations Committee; 1 Cosponsor

18. S.Res.250 A resolution condemning horrific acts of violence against Burma's Rohingya population and calling on Aung San Suu Kyi to play an active role in ending this humanitarian tragedy

This resolution condemns the violence and displacement inflicted on Burma's Rohingya civilians; calls for an immediate halt to all hostilities by Burmese authorities, to include ending restrictions on the movement of the Rohingya and providing them with citizenship; and urges Burma to allow United Nations fact-finding missions and the resumption of relief work, aid, and monitoring by humanitarian organizations.

Primary Sponsor: Richard Durbin D-IL
Status: 9/7/17 Referred to Foreign Relations Committee; 25 Cosponsors



SENATE SCORED ITEMS

19. S.Res.291 A resolution affirming the historical connection of the Jewish people to the ancient and sacred city of Jerusalem and condemning efforts at the United Nations Educational, Scientific, and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) to deny Judaism’s millennia-old historical, religious, and cultural ties to Jerusalem

This resolution commends the government of Israel for protecting the freedoms of all faiths in Jerusalem and ensuring their access to holy sites. It condemns efforts by the United Nations Educational, Scientific and Cultural Organization (UNESCO) to delegitimize Israel through attempts to rewrite and deny Jerusalem’s history and encourages the U.S. to continue working with allies to prevent UNESCO from passing biased anti-Israel resolutions.

20. S.Res.359 A resolution commending the Government of Bangladesh for its compassion during the Rohingya humanitarian crisis and commending Pope Francis for his message of peace

This resolution commends Bangladesh for its compassion, tolerance, and critical humanitarian aid for the Rohingya refugees and urges all parties involved in the repatriation process to reject any actions which could continue or worsen the harsh conditions faced by Rohingya refugees, including their confinement in camps, contained ghettos, or villages where movement is restricted in Burma, or on the flood-prone Bhashan Char island or any other location that would result in further isolation.

21. S.Res.360 A resolution calling for international accountability for the crimes against humanity committed by the Burmese military against the Rohingya in Burma

This resolution condemns the Burmese military for its atrocities against the Rohingya, which constitute ethnic cleansing and crimes against humanity. It urges Burma to take immediate steps to close internally displaced persons (IDP) camps and the Rohingya ghetto at Aung Mingalar in Sittwe while respecting the rights and dignity of populations currently residing there; to further lift restrictions on freedom of movement of Rohingya living in villages throughout northern Rakhine State; to conduct a comprehensive and transparent investigation; and to hold perpetrators accountable, referring them to the International Criminal Court. It calls for the international community to assist with the economic development of the Rakhine State.

SENATE SCORED ITEMS

SENATE HUMAN RIGHTS CAUCUS

Originally founded in 2014 by Senator Chris Coons (D-DE) and former Senator Mark Kirk (R-IL), the Senate Human Rights Caucus relaunched in 2017 under Senator Coons and Senator Thom Tillis (R-NC). The Caucus is a bipartisan effort to highlight the importance of human rights in U.S. foreign policy. The mission of the Caucus is to defend and advocate for internationally recognized human rights norms around the world and contribute to global leadership in promoting and protecting human rights. Membership is open to all members of the Senate.



HOUSE SCORED ITEMS

1. H.R.379 Justice for Yazidis Act

This bill calls for Syrian and Iraqi nationals who are members of a religious minority to be classified as refugees of special humanitarian concern and to be eligible for priority-2 refugee resettlement processing. It also calls for the State Department to establish a program to provide health care and psychosocial support for members of the Yazidi, Christian, Shabak, and Turkmen communities displaced by ISIS.

2. H.R.390 Iraq and Syria Genocide Relief and Accountability Act of 2017

This bill provides emergency relief for victims of genocide, crimes against humanity, and war crimes against members of Iraqi or Syrian minority religious or ethnic groups, and for accountability for perpetrators of these crimes.

Status: 6/10/17 Passed House amended, by voice vote; 9/19/17 Placed on Senate Legislative Calendar; 47 Cosponsors

3. H.R.672 Combating European Anti-Semitism Act of 2017

This bill requires continued and enhanced annual reporting to Congress in the Annual Report on International Religious Freedom on anti-Semitic incidents in Europe, the safety and security of European Jewish communities, and the efforts of the United States to partner with European governments, the European Union, and civil society groups, to combat anti-Semitism.

Primary Sponsor: Nita Lowey D-NY

Status: 5/17/17 Passed House amended, by voice vote; 5/18/2017 Referred to the Senate Foreign Relations Committee; 34 Cosponsors

4. H.R.1911 Special Envoy to Monitor and Combat Anti-Semitism Act of 2017

This bill amends the State Department Basic Authorities Act of 1956 to provide that the Special Envoy to Monitor and Combat Anti-Semitism shall have the rank of ambassador appointed by the President and shall monitor and combat anti-Semitism globally.

Status: 5/18/17 Referred to Foreign Affairs Subcommittee on Africa, Global Health, Global Human Rights and International Organizations; 61 Cosponsors

5.H.R.2061 North Korean Human Rights Reauthorization Act of 2017

This bill amends the North Korean Human Rights Act of 2004 to authorize appropriations through 2022 for programs that promote human rights, democracy, the rule of law, and the development of a market economy in North Korea; actions to promote freedom of information in North Korea; and humanitarian assistance to North Koreans who are outside of North Korea without the permission of the government.

Status: 9/25/17 Passed House amended 415-0; 9/26/2017 Referred to Senate Foreign Relations Committee; 16 Cosponsors

6. H.R.2826 Refugee Program Integrity Restoration Act of 2017

This bill amends the Immigration and Nationality Act to grant priority consideration for applicants whose claims are based on persecution or a well-founded fear of persecution based on religion by reason of those applicants being practitioners of a minority religion in a country of particular concern.

Primary Sponsor: Raul Labrador R-ID

Status: 6/28/17 Ordered to be Reported (Amended) by Judiciary Subcommittee on Immigration and Border Security; 14 Cosponsors

7. H.R.3030 Elie Wiesel Genocide and Atrocities Prevention Act of 2017

This bill helps prevent acts of genocide and other atrocity crimes, which threaten national and international security, by enhancing United States Government capacities to prevent, mitigate, and respond to such crises.

8. H.R.3776 Cyber Diplomacy Act of 2017

This bill establishes an Office of Cyber Issues to lead the State Department's diplomatic cyberspace efforts to promote an open and unfettered information and communications technology infrastructure globally. It requires annual reports assessing the extent to which countries censor, block, and otherwise interfere with nonviolent expression of political or religious opinions or beliefs and the extent to which such countries persecute individuals or groups for such expressions.

9. H.R.3856 Hong Kong Human Rights and Democracy Act of 2017

This bill directs the President to identify individuals responsible for the surveillance, abduction, detention, abuse, or forced confession of any Hong Kong resident in connection with the exercise by that individual of the right to freedom of speech, freedom of the press, freedom of assembly, freedom of association, and freedom of religion.

10. H.R.4223 BURMA Act of 2017

This bill establishes US policy supporting the establishment of a peaceful, prosperous, and democratic Burma that includes respect for the human rights of all its people regardless of ethnicity and religion, including an end to the humanitarian and human rights crisis, the return of the displaced Rohingya to their homes, equal access to full restoration of full citizenship for the Rohingya population.

11. H.R.4549 Saudi Educational Transparency and Reform Act

This resolution urges the U.S. to publicly call for the immediate and unconditional release of all those held prisoner for expressing their political or religious views in Tibet; to continue to designate China as a country of particular concern pursuant to the International Religious Freedom Act of 1998; and to urge the Chinese government to stop the demolition of Tibetan Buddhist religious institutions and revise religious and travel regulations to conform with international human rights standards.

It calls for Burma to end such attacks in the state of Rakhine, to allow humanitarian access to refugees and internally displaced persons, to allow refugees to return to Burma, and to change laws and policies that have contributed to insecurity in Rakhine.

This resolution urges China to halt suppression of the religious, cultural, social, economic, and environmental rights of the Tibetan people in Tenzin Delek Rinpoche’s home regions of Lihang and Nyagchu and across all areas of traditional Tibet.

16. H.Res.128 Supporting respect for human rights and encouraging inclusive governance in Ethiopia

It calls on the Ethiopian government to investigate the use of excessive force during the Oromo people’s Irreecha religious festivities and supports the peaceful efforts of the Ethiopian people to exercise their constitutional rights.

This resolution calls on the President to strengthen U.S. religious freedom diplomacy; appoint a new Ambassador-at-Large for International Religious Freedom; name a Special Advisor for International Religious Freedom at the National Security Council; develop a national security strategy on international religious freedom; direct grants to specified groups engaged in innovative programs to build and strengthen pluralistic societies, protect freedom of religion, reduce conflict, and counter violent religious extremism and terrorism; develop a comprehensive response to protect victims of religious persecution and to provide humanitarian and recovery assistance to affected individuals in Iraq and Syria; and re-establish the Religion and Foreign Policy Working Group.

It also urges the governments of those countries to release such people unconditionally and ensure their safety.

This resolution calls upon the US government to uphold its international leadership role in responding to displacement crises with humanitarian assistance and protection of the most vulnerable populations who endure sexual violence, human trafficking, persecution and violence against religious minorities, forced conscription, genocide, and exploitation. It reaffirms the goals of World Refugee Day and reiterates the strong commitment to protect the millions of refugees who live without material, social, or legal protections.

23. H.Res.407 Condemning the persecution of Christians around the world

HUMAN RIGHTS AND RELIGIOUS FREEDOM GROUPS FOR MEMBERS OF THE HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES

Congressional Ahmadiyya Muslim Caucus

The Ahmadiyya Muslim Caucus was launched in 2014 by former Congressman Frank Wolf (R-VA) and Jackie Speier (D-CA) to educate members of Congress about the repression of religious minorities worldwide, including Ahmadi Muslims, Christians, and other persecuted communities. Current co-chairs are Speier and Peter King (R-NY). The caucus seeks redress for ongoing religious intolerance against Ahmadi Muslims in South and Central Asia, the Middle East and East Asia, including Pakistan, Saudi Arabia and Indonesia. This bipartisan caucus staunchly opposes persecution and violence against all religious minorities and believes that everyone should have the right to worship as they choose.

Congressional International Religious Freedom Caucus

Founded in 2006, the bipartisan Congressional International Religious Freedom Caucus was established to address religious persecution around the world. It plays a critical role in raising the profile of numerous religious freedom issues in Congress. Its work has led to the release of many individuals imprisoned for their faith and ensures relief for many suffering under religious persecution.

Religious Minorities in the Middle East Caucus

The Religious Minorities in the Middle East Caucus, founded in 2008, is a bipartisan Congressional Member organization that serves as an informational and advocacy tool for besieged religious minorities who are central to a pluralistic, multi-cultural Middle East.

Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission

Founded in 2008, the bipartisan Tom Lantos Human Rights Commission is charged with promoting, defending and advocating for international human rights as enshrined in the Universal Declaration of Human Rights. The Commission undertakes public education activities, provides expert human rights advice and encourages members of Congress to proactively engage in human rights matters, of which international religious freedom is one. In carrying out its mandate, the Commission collaborates with congressional staff, the U.S. Senate and the executive branch, and continually engages with national and international civil society organizations.
